


Livelihood Zone Map




Previous Livelihood zone Map



Analysis Team Composition

The period or consumption year covered by the current analysis is **September 2018 – August 2019** for the seven livelihood zones but across 5 states as projected.

The analysis shows that the very poor households in MAS, CGC and MCS livelihood zone would likely face a livelihood protection deficit 1%, 8% & 12% respectively with the very poor in MCS LZ also facing a survival deficits of 7%, while the remaining wealth groups across the other LZs are not expected to face any deficit.

Households facing survival deficit would not be able to meet their daily food needs and therefore requires urgent support to meet their food needs during the deficit period, while households facing livelihood protection deficit would require support to meet their livelihood needs, this will also prevent the use high cost coping mechanism. While households not facing deficits would be able to access food and cash income to meet their normal food and non food needs within the projected period.






Result- Borno NG12



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Result- Katsina (MAS LZ)




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Result- Zamfara (CGC)

Conclusion & Recommendation

There has been various humanitarian intervention in Borno (northeast), however some persons still face food insecurity as some LGAs remain inaccessible following the persistence of security challenge with the region. Very poor households in CGC and MAS LZs would as well require support to meet their livelihood needs with the deficit period to prevent the use of non acceptable/high cost coping mechanism.

High level of insecurity, previously cattle rustling in CGC LZ (Zamfara state) but has further deteriorated to kidnapping/killing in some communities within zone. This has significantly affected activities within the area.

Government to intensify effort to improve the security situation in Nigeria.

Focus on development interventions to improve resilience among the vulnerable households.

Given the on-going harvest of some crops, an update of the OA would be done in March to account for these changes and staple food prices would be constantly monitored as the leans season progresses.
